## LeMay Motorcycle Days 2019

As the riding season rapidly approaches, we're all looking at the calendar and making plans. One event in the Northwest that we should consider is Lemay Motorcycle Days at Marymount in Tacoma, WA.

Yes, the dates overlap with the MOA National, so some of us will be out of town; but for those who aren't off traveling, it's a great event near home. And actually, if you're coming straight home from the MOA Rally, you can still enjoy the tail end of it.

So let's get to what and when it is: Lemay Motorcycle Days is a ten day celebration of all things Motorcycle. Okay, maybe just most things; but it covers a pretty broad spectrum. It runs from **June 13–23, 2019**. Hours are 9:00 am to 5:00 pm every day.

#### The Event is held at:

LeMay Collections at Marymount, 325 152nd Street E Tacoma Washington, 98445

The centerpiece of the event is a classic and vintage bike show of about 200 bikes. This year's theme is "Italian", but the show will include a wide variety of bikes from a large number of manufacturers both current and extinct (okay, maybe that's a bit harsh—because if people care for the bikes, they're not really extinct; but the manufacturer doesn't exist anymore).

Incidentally, should you have a bike you'd like to display, you can do that. Read on (toward the end).

Along with the bike show there are events on the weekends bracketing the show. There's a Show & Shine, a great AHRMA Vintage Trials event, a killer Women's Conference moderated by and featuring Mary McGee and Debbi (Selden) Pugh, Motorcycle Soccer, a Summer Solstice procession where the Wicked Witch of Winter gets banished, a Seattle Cossacks Stunt Team Performance, Field Skill Events in which you can participate (and see if you do as well as the Cossacks), and a Benefit Run and Ice Cream Social benefitting the Washington Soldier's Home in Orting.

Phew! Let me catch my breath. There's also food booths on site, various vendors, displays by the Pacific Northwest Museum of Motorcycling—last year presenting ground-breaking research on the first American Woman Motorcyclist, whose story has twists and turns that would rival a soap opera (but don't take my word for it, check out the research for yourself).

Of course, the Motorcycle Show and History displays are there to look at all day every day.

The cost? Free to Lemay Family Collection members, \$15 for a one day admission, \$30 for a multi-day pass, special promotions for the Women's conference (women who arrive by bike – rider or passenger - \$5) and Father's Day (dads get in for \$5 whether they arrive by motorcycle or not). Bit of a double standard there? Women have to show up on a bike to get the special deal, dads don't. Just saying.

Or maybe you'd like to get in free? If you display your bike in the show you get an Exhibitor's Pass that get you in free for the entirety of the event. If you have a bike you'd like to display, contact info@ lemaymarymount.org for information and a copy of the Vehicle Loan Agreement.



## Remembering Ramey "Coach" Stroud

Long-time BMWRO member, Ramey Stroud (AKA: Coach), passed away March 30, 2019. Coach shared his knowledge by teaching motorcycling skills at our Chief Joseph Rally as well as teaching motorcycling skills at his ranch near Lyons, OR. He was a keynote speaker at our Annual Meeting in November 2014. The following excerpt is from a story written about the life of Ramey "Coach" Stroud by Andrew Shaughnessy, published January 2, 2019. Coach will be fondly remembered by the many lives he touched. Rest in peace, my friend.

Excerpt from Shaughnessy's story:

"That's it," Stroud told me, gesturing to the place he planned to die. It was a good spot — the crest of a grassy hill, surrounded by an ancient forest of towering trees, with a clear view of the wooded valley rolling beyond. Nearby, a creek sang over the moss and rocks,

and the mountains rose green and silent in the Oregon sky.

"You know, there's a beginning, a middle, and an end," he mused, looking out over the valley. "And if you live the middle part right, the end is not so tragic."

Over the course of his 71 years, Ramey "Coach" Stroud has striven to live the middle part right.

He's one of those characters that seems plucked straight out of an adventure novel, his story is a collection of madcap escapades, whirlwind romances, and feats of derring-do. Looming large in Stroud's childhood memories is his Uncle Roy, a lanky desert cowboy — quiet, except when he had something to say. He wore a big hat and boots and had a slow way of talking.

"Ramey," Uncle Roy would say, "you want to get along in this life, you gotta learn to do three things: jump high, fart loud, and fear nothing."

They were words Stroud would live by.

the moment was moving to the northeast...and after about 10:15 am, it was clear skies for the rest of the day!


Could <u>weather.com</u> be trusted? We were going to find out.

9:45 rolled around, and we were off. The rain had tapered to a gentle mist. I was so encouraged I put away my rain gloves and slipped into my everyday Helds. Bad decision. Blinded by my post-10:15 optimism, I neglected to consider our first twenty miles were due south, directly back into the storm. In ten minutes, my gloves were soaked. But in another ten, we exited I-5, heading west. By the time we reached the swollen Willamette to board the Wheatland Ferry, the rain had stopped. We had seen the last rain of the day.

The rain or shine few included our GTL posse: Cam & Karen Rust on one, Kim Dorsing and Janice Mathern on the other. Kyle Emerson, who has only recently

moved to Oregon, joined us for the third consecutive month—demonstrating that neither cold nor wet will deter him from a good ride. Mike Ripley made his routine trek from Arizona, perhaps against his better judgment; battling a stomach flu, he cried "No mas!" when we stopped for gas in Monmouth. Charles Trapp and his GS were also with us; his smile just seems to get bigger as the weather worsens. Ric Holderbaum brought up the rear, ensuring that nobody would be left behind.

West of the river, the skies were blue and the roads were drying. Right on time; 10:15 had come and gone. After gassing up—and bidding adieu to Mr.

Now that we were warmed up, it was time for some technical riding. OR-180 is a designated, but completely unsigned state highway, which roughly parallels (in the same way the flight of a bee might parallel the side of your house) OR-20 between Blodgett and Eddyville. It's narrow, with plenty of decreasing radius turns and at least five railroad crossings along its twenty-mile length. The rail crossings range from never repaired (Oh my God, I just bent a rim) to state-of-the art (What's the big deal?). In other words, it was the best part of the ride...so far. We had originally intended to head directly to Siletz via Logsden Road. but the week's heavy rain raised concern about a two-mile gravel stretch. All were in agreement that we had not short-changed ourselves at all by taking the alternative route. Yet, on a nice day, it's a beautiful ride which I highly recommend.

Near Eddyville, we merged onto OR-20 for the last run to Siletz.

Siletz is a quiet town situated along the Siletz River, only eight miles from the ocean. Established in 1910, the city was incorporated in 1946 and today exists mostly to serve the health needs of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz. The social center of town is the rather weather-beaten Siletz Road House & Brewery. Don't let the drab exterior deter you. We were warmly greeted with a large table set just for us. The food, especially the wraps, was excellent, as was the service. After 140 hard miles, it was the perfect place to catch our breath.

As if we hadn't had enough fun, some of the best riding of the day was yet to come. Any riders who've lapped the state know the carnival ride that is OR-229 north of Siletz. Afterward, those expecting a placid ride through Lincoln City and home then got the shock of the day when we abruptly veered back inland south of town. Drift Creek Road/NF-17/Bear Creek Road is twenty-one miles of mountain meander, about

as close to off-roading a street bike will want to get. The road, barely a lane-and-a-half wide is intended for two-way traffic, making every blind corner its own private adventure. It rises almost 1,700 feet to run a ridgeline barely as wide as the roadway. At the midpoint sits a popular trailhead. We've been here before: in 2016, a ride included a four-mile hike to Drift Creek Falls and the impressive suspension

bridge over it. Luck was with us on this Saturday; oncoming traffic was light and the gravel descent near the north end of the road was easy for all to negotiate.

Now back on OR-18, it was time to dead head home. We all agreed that it had been one of our better outings, made nearly perfect by the weather that almost wasn't. I'm knocking on wood that our string of (mostly) dry First Saturdays continues. Join us and see if we can keep the streak alive!
