Report Card

As we bid good-bye to 2015

and hello to 2016 it seems a good time to look back and then forward. As they say, the one constant in life (or this club) is change. We can try with all our might, but change *IS* happening. In 2015 we made some changes that are very positive and will help us to reach our goals now and in the future.

In membership (defined as one household), we grew slightly from 259 at end of 2014 to 266 at end of year 2015. That is a 3% increase and positive sign for the future. Our club's future depends on new members coming into the club. New members and continuing members come to, and continue with the club because of the experience. We must continue to create, build and grow that experience and while keeping the enjoyable traditions we love. Members need to see the value of the club and then help to build on those experiences. New and then involved experienced members are the catalyst for the club's future.

The Chief Joseph Rally Attendance was 520 people in 2014 and 455 guests in 2015, so down about 13%. The attendance was bit of a concern but still a success. The CJR is very much a defining event for our club each year. We, the members, have some of our most enjoyable moments of the year at the rally. The profit this year was about \$7,700, so that was good. Our club's annual spending is about 50% financed by the rally (the other major income is your membership). Our charitable work is totally dependent on the rally, because without the rally we could not make donations such as our \$2000 wildfire relief donation. We need to continue to support CJR in whatever way we can, as much of our club's livelihood is dependent on our rally.

For the year-end financial outcome we have \$16,700 currently compared to \$18,058 in EOY 2014. So we are down slightly but that seems okay. That number is not too bad when you factor in our donation to the John Day Fire Relief fund and the smaller rally. Our outgoing Treasurer, Gordon, has done a great job of preserving our hard earned dollars. We are quite healthy but an area that needs continued attention to remain that way.

At the beginning of 2015 we started our two year cycles for club officers; in lieu of replacing all the officers each year. The club approved this in 2014 for the continuity of club knowledge and implementation has been phased in over 2015 and into 2016. The Secretary and President started on the two-year cycle at the beginning of 2015 and your new VP and Treasurer are getting their feet wet right now. In the fall of 2016 you will be voting again for a new President and Secretary, so start thinking about good candidates for those positions. I highly recommend the experience for those that want to help set the direction of the club, grow their leadership skills and a get sense of accomplishment.

We had some super events in 2015 including early spring campouts: a Gypsy Tour, a Smoked-Out Campout, a Team Oregon class, and meetings in interesting places like Florence and John Day. Our new VP is working on an Activities calendar for the New Year and we will soon have another visit to Florence on the weekend of January 16. We have a sports theme this year (so come prepared) and some interesting topics that will be discussed. If you haven't signed up, go immediately to the Club Calendar for sign up.

And now I need to put a plug in for "re-upping." It is that time of the year where we ask you to go to the web and renew your club dues. We ask that you do it online if possible so our people don't have to hand type the applications for 260 people into our systems. It only takes a minute and you can use a credit card or mail a check. See elsewhere in the issue for details.

We are looking forward to another banner year and expect it to be better than the last. Yours and everyone's efforts support the overall goal of the club to give good fellowship and fun experiences for the motorcycling members in a community atmosphere.

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NEW OREGON MOTORCYCLE LAWS FOR 2016!

2015 was a busy legislative session for motorcyclists in Oregon. These are a few of the notable bills and what it means for you in 2016:

Motorcycles stuck at red lights:

SB 533A, aka the "Dead Red" bill, passed the Senate and House and was signed by the Governor. Beginning on 1/1/16, if you are on your motorcycle (or bicycle) and a sensor-activated light does not detect you, you will be allowed to proceed cautiously through the red light after a full cycle has passed.

Uninsured/Under-Insured Motorist (UM/UIM) coverage:

SB 411A passed the Senate and House and was signed by the Governor. Previously, if you were in a motorcycle accident, your total insurance coverage would be the greatest coverage that was available because you could not "stack" your UM/UIM coverage on top of the at-fault party's coverage (50+50=50). Under the new law, your total insurance coverage is the total amount of all coverage available because you will be able to "stack" your UM/UIM coverage (50+50=100). The new law goes into effect on 1/1/16. I encourage all riders to buy as much UM/UIM coverage as they can because it is for YOUR protection from negligent cagers!

Standing on your footpegs:

SB 878 passed the Senate and House and was signed by the Governor. SB 878 allows motorcyclists to stand on their footpegs while facing forward when needed. Previously, motorcyclists were required to stay seated at all times. Please note that Oregon law still prohibits "stunting" and other forms of exhibition riding. The new law goes into effect on 1/1/16.

LANE SPLITTING/FILTERING IS STILL ILLEGAL IN OREGON:

SB 694A, which would have allowed limited lane splitting/filtering on highways, passed the Senate with a 2/3 majority but was later killed in the House Committee on Transportation and Economic Development before it could get to the House floor after strong opposition by ODOT and the Portland Police Department.

No stunting! You, stand-up riders. ;-)








NW Ambassadors Ride Report-December 2015

Given that this may turn out to be the wettest December in northwest history, it should come as no surprise that we started our First Saturday ride in the rain. The first surprise was that the rain came and went very quickly. A very big second surprise came later.

As the appointed hour neared, our gang of eight stalwarts plodded a bit, each engaged in one stage or another of winter bundling. Eventually, off we flew...David leading the ride, followed by Chris Henry (all the way from Eugene), Ric Holderbaum, Colin Luther, Neal Malagamba, Steven Polansky, and Mark Wegener, who we hadn't seen in over a year. Mike swept, his bright amber aux lights a reassuring sign at intersections that we were all present and accounted for.



Despite our enthusiasm, prudence dictates that we dial back our aspirations at this time of the year. Today's ride was going to be a backroad tour of the Willamette Valley as it encompasses Washington and Yamhill counties. With Tigard behind us, we found ourselves on Sherwood-Scholls Road. Our usual route might be to meander on to Scholls, then to

Bald Peak or to Newberg. Today we stayed straight onto Lebeau Road, a narrower ribbon passing sizeable parcels and emerging wineries. Lebeau to Aebischer to Leander to Bell is an excellent alternative to the scenic but busy OR-219. Soon we were bypassing Newberg, then Yamhill, then McMinnville, before conceding our interesting route to OR-18 and the mass traffic to Lincoln City.

But this didn't last long. Even though this was intended to be a shorter ride, the weather was just too decent to deadhead to lunch. The next exit was Sheridan, and beyond Sheridan are Rock Creek and Buck Hollow Roads, a subtle departure from our flatland route into the eastern foothills of the coast range. When pre-riding the week before, we had found these deeply shaded sections to be more frosted than most motorcyclists would find comfortable. But with today's temperature a good 10° warmer, it was no problem at all. Another twenty minutes toward Willamina and over Ft. Hill Road and we were pulling into the parking lot of Spirit Mountain Casino.

The Mountain View Sports Bar is the first thing you encounter when you enter the casino. In sharp contrast to last month's ride, where we crowded into a small coffee kiosk to have lunch, the Mountain View offered plenty of seating, with a large open stage area that was the perfect place to stow gear. Lunch was quick and tasty; their natural grass fed beef burgers are particularly good. Neal mentioned this was a devirgining of sorts—the first time he had ever set foot in a casino. As much as we wanted to introduce him to the lure of craps and slots, that would have to wait until another day.

Our ride back was to be eastward on the south side of OR-18. On the pre-ride, we had bypassed Ballston Road, staying on OR-18 until we exited onto Bellevue-Hopewell Hwy. David's intent had been to exit OR-18 earlier, and this ride, that's exactly what we did.

It was a fateful choice. Ballston Road is a series of dike roads that run in absolute straight lines above the surrounding farmland until

property lines force the route 90 degrees left or right. It is about five miles to the single intersection that is the unincorporated community of Ballston. As we departed OR-18, all seven companions were readily visible to David as he extended the next orthogonal. But as he accelerated across the intersection at Ballston, he heard Neal tap his horn: they were alone.

Ordinarily, the front runners would simply wait for the rest to catch up. But it was immediately clear they had stopped, meaning a bike had broken down... or worse. David and Neal turned around and soon Colin came into view, sitting by the roadside. Getting closer revealed his bike on its side, missing most of its plastic. *Please be okay, please be okay* was all David could muster.

And he was okay. Colin had hit a deer, or more to the point, been hit by a deer. Noticed by neither David nor Neal, Colin, third in line, got a lapful, a doe, about 40 pounds. He was extremely lucky; the deer had been hit in mid-leap by the bike, just above the front wheel. Only then did the deer roll over the bars and into his lap. He heaved it aside and rolled the now powerless bike to the side of the road. Stepping off of it. Colin walked across the

road and sat down, deer shit and blood decorating his brand new Klim suit. He was battered and bruised, and perhaps in a little bit of shock. First responders checked his vitals, but when an ambulance arrived minutes later, he waved it off. After an entertaining *Who's on First* routine with the insurance company, a tow truck arrived to transport the bike back to Tigard; Colin even talked the driver into a ride home.

Although we stood roadside for 90 minutes plus, the weather, though chilly, remained dry. It was 3:30 pm—time to get home. But we had a ride to finish! So finish we did—through Amity, over Eola Hill and across the Wheatland Ferry. David talked to Colin on Sunday and he was bruised, but taking it all in stride. He went to work on Monday, and now, weeks later, his biggest dilemma is, Which bike next?
