

A Most Enterprising Weekend

NW Ambassadors Ride Report- August 2019 David Peterson #90113



For over six years, we've been chasing around local country roads in search of the almighty route less travelled. We've covered a lot of ground, some of which is becoming all too familiar. So once a year, we expand our horizons to experience territory some riders have only heard about. This August, fellow Ambassador **Neal Malagamba** served as my muse. Riding with us since 2014, when we're east of Mt. Hood, he never missed an opportunity to remind me that his moto-horizon extended only to slightly east of Condon. This year, I was determined to immerse Neal, and a few hardy others, in as much eastern adventure as three days would allow.

Planning began in January. In past years, our August ride has been an overnight out and back. It didn't take long to settle on Enterprise, fully a day's ride from Portland, with fulsome and sparse routes galore to accommodate both those who wanted the full-day treatment and those who might need to get to/from there more directly. The Ponderosa Motel would be our hub, well located in the center of town; those who wanted to camp could join us from the Loghouse Campground nearby. The aggressive route would include the best northern Oregon has to offer. But the main reason Enterprise was so appealing was that, with an additional day, we could throw two additional states into the mix. It would make for a *longggg* day. But with the right mix of folks, I thought we could pull it off.

Day 1

We settled on twenty as the maximum number of folks we could efficiently sweep across the state in a single day. To give us a jump on traffic, we launched from Sandy instead of Tigard BMW. We were launching on a good note; all had found their way to the unfamiliar venue. In a flash, it was time to depart.

Our route was as rural as possible, meaning fuel might be an issue. To accommodate the most mileage-challenged, we made an early stop near Government Camp. We were quickly ready to roll, when **Kim Dorsing** had a medical emergency. He had not been feeling well leading up to the ride, and this early stop informed him that a long ride just wasn't in the cards this weekend. After assuring us he and **Janice** could limp home safely, we continued our eastward assault. A couple texts and a phone call later and we knew Kim was resting comfortably at home.

Meanwhile, the fun was about to begin. **Steve Woodward** raced ahead to capture us on film as we rolled by. Our favorite route east runs through Wamic, crossing US-197 at Tygh Valley. Onto OR-216, we rolled across Sherars Bridge and began the magnificent ascent up Kerr Canyon's north wall. An aside: for many years, we've blasted myopically toward Sherars Bridge. Needing a break, we stopped this time at White River Falls State Park. It's a great oasis and in this arid climate, the falls are a shock to the eyes. Definitely worth a visit.

After 370 miles, we mustered the energy to conquer Lewiston's Old Spiral Highway. Unfortunately, the day's ride was less than spectacular. About ten years ago, newly paved, it was one of the finest experiences of my motorcycling life. Today, however, it was warm — and the thousands of tar snakes ruled the day. So much so that it was the group consensus to take US-95 back down to the river to continue the last leg to Enterprise.

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I was one of the last to climb OSH, and my arrival was greeted with unusual scrutiny of my shredded front tire. I had checked it in the morning, slightly delaying our departure while I topped off air. But it had been a long, warm day of pushing hard in the corners. I was shocked at what I saw...a little embarrassed too. After all, who was I to shake my finger at folks about being prepared for the ride? I could have limped home, taking baby turns while the rest of the pack devoured Rattlesnake Canyon and beyond. That didn't sound like much fun.

Then I remembered Mac's. It was 4:50pm...were they open until 5? A quick call to Shaun in Service confirmed they were open...and they had a tire...and they would wait for me! For the moment, the group was on its own, but in very good hands with **Chris Henry** and **Mike Ripley** leading the way. I shot down the hill, rolled into the shop...and by 5:35, we were on our way again with a brand new PR5. Snaking back through Rattlesnake Canyon.

Rattlesnake Canyon always gets my juices flowing...even 347 miles into the day. Overlooked in all the excitement is the first five miles or so, as WA-129 climbs 1,000 feet from Asotin toward Anatone. Then, after 20 miles, the fun begins anew. For 10 miles, the road wraps around the canyon wall as the Grande Ronde and Oregon unfold in the distance. Boggan's Oasis just across the river on the canyon floor is a great stop for ice cream (and if you're interested in a

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Hollow Road, an unexpected and wonderful carousel that dropped us into Red Elk Canyon that set up the breakfast sprint to Pendleton.

The Saddle is an enormous road house clearly favored by cowboys and farmers around Pendleton. Just east of downtown, it's the perfect complement to the Round-Up and Happy Canyon Hall of Fame that marks the other end of town. Our group had dwindled to thirteen, but they were able to seat us together in what appeared to be the restaurant's third annex. It was lonely for a moment until an even larger group joined us. With all these mouths to feed, the service and food was still some of the best of the trip.

After breakfast, we lost Steven to I-5 and Bill and Linda to central Oregon. The final ten blasted north and west back into Washington, converging on Bickleton from the southeast via Alderdale/6 Prong/Sand Ridge Roads. Temperatures rose back into the 90s, with a little midwestern humidity thrown in, which made the traditional ice cream stop in Goldendale all the more welcome.

Down Klickitat Canyon to Lyle; we were having so much fun we couldn't surrender to the final slog just yet. I quickly ducked right onto Old Highway 8 for one last twisty detour. So did all seven of the remaining bikes behind me.

We usually press all the way home, but a last minute plea for rest yielded a final stop. All seemed relieved. We high-fived and hugged, grateful for the route, the weather, and the camaraderie.

Many thanks to all who participated. Our weekend in Enterprise will be a tough act to follow.
